### Purpose of the research

#### Procedures of this study

This survey invites you to share your views on the barriers to, and enablers and motivators for, researchers engaging with organisations beyond academia. There are 18 questions, scored on a Likert scale, or by selecting from a drop-down menu, and a free text box if you would like to give any further information. There are also some optional Equality, Diversity, and Inclusivity (EDI) questions, to enable us to ensure that research findings and outputs are inclusive and accessible. There is no obligation to complete these questions.

We estimate it should take 10-15 minutes to complete this survey.

## Benefits and risks of taking part

There is unlikely to be any immediate direct or personal benefit to you in taking part, but we hope the survey results will inform the development of training initiatives in business skills, competencies and mindsets for doctoral and early-career researchers that you may find useful in your career. There may be some benefit to society; but this cannot be assured at the start of the research project. There are no risks to taking part in this research greater than that which you may encounter on a daily basis in your normal life. Withdrawal after completing the survey is not possible as your responses, once submitted, will not be identifiable to the researcher to enable removal from the data set.
